Dear Friends:

In 2020-2021 the pandemic continued to affect our program, staff, children, and families. Following our return to in-person programming staff agencywide embraced the challenges brought on by COVID-19. The effects of COVID included a reduction in children in each classroom, fewer class days in pre k partnership rooms, and changes to classroom operations and environment. Program adjustments included social distancing, masking, and individualized activities involving sand and water along with remote support to families all implemented to keep our program open and safe while serving 281 children throughout the year.

We have a fantastic teaching team and support personnel who navigated evolving expectations with grace and success bringing their best daily. They became effective communicators providing virtual learning and hands on activities to families remotely. Teaching staff's commitment along with reduced class sizes and increased parent involvement resulted in some of the highest child development outcome scores to date.

Promise Early Education Center continues to build on 56 years as a Head Start funded program to ensure all eligible children have access to equitable learning opportunities. We look forward to continued collaboration with our many community partners in 2022 as it is our privilege to bring high-quality early childhood education to families living in Androscoggin County.





Food Pantry

Promise is proud to partner with Good Shepherd to provide fresh produce, dairy and shelf-stable items to our families. In FY21 the food pantry distributed 25,107 pounds of food.

Parents at each site are offered the opportunity to shop from a wide assortment of fresh fruits, vegetables, meats, canned items and cleaning supplies. Over 80 % of Promise families accessed the Pantry on a regular basis in FY21.







The 5-week summer program focused on Science, Technology, Reading, Engineering, Arts and Math. Children received materials and non-fiction texts each week. Teachers read books and modeled use of new toys and games in Zoom classes and teacher created videos. During outdoor home visits, teachers supported families use of resources using hula hoops as a visual prompt to physically distance. Families reported that learning how to use the materials with their children helped them feel more confident about engaging in the activities!



Support Parents in Play

As their child's first and most influential teacher, parents have an important role in Head Start.

Parents participate in numerous activities throughout the year including parent meetings, parent trainings, home visits, socializations, policy council and the development of Family Partnership Agreements.



Nutrition

USDA meals and snacks are provided to meet the nutritional needs of young children.

Meals at Promise promote a healthy relationship to a child's first foods. Children learn to make healthy food choices by seeing positive attitudes from teachers and peers. Mealtimes and nutritional activities help support a child's learning, social, and fine motor skills.


Health/Special Services



Data represents % of children who meet or exceed developmental expectations


Assessments completed by inter-rater reliable teaching staff using Teaching Strategies Gold Assessment System

Promise supports staff in furthering their education through a generous tuition assist program that pays for courses up front. During FY21, \$29,201.66 in tuition supported 11 employees in furthering their education.

A robust professional development program is also provided to enhance staff skills and knowledge. Training opportunities include: CPR and First Aid, Safety Care, Med 101, Active Supervision, Pyramid (supports children's emotional health), Child Abuse, Second Language Acquisition, Culturally Responsive Environments, Family Development Credential and Child Development Associate Credential.
